*They don't seem to be dangerous.*

## **TASK 2**

Why is it important to judge people for who they are, not on the way they look or for the person we think they will be? Explain fully giving examples.

*It is important that we don't judge people based on how they look because just because somebody looks dangerous, it doesn't necessarily mean that they are. We should only judge people based on their actions because someone who looks dangerous could actually be a very kind person, and someone who looks innocent could be quite dangerous.*

### **Challenge:**

**Where do you think stereotypes come from?**

*I think they come from when somebody meets someone who acts a certain way, and that person then believes that people like that person act similarly.*

**Why are they so powerful?**

*They are powerful because sometimes, stereotypes can help you if you are in a dangerous situation.*
